PAT Personal Visit Planning Guide Support Form

This form was designed to provide answers to common questions pertaining to agency guidelines on the PAT Personal Visit Planning Guide (PVPG)

Parent Child Interaction

PAT activities can be ...

- repeated with the same family.
 Suggestion: Reflect on child's abilities from previous time activity was completed.
- from different age ranges and be adapted to fit the needs of the child.
 - Ex: You may choose a 24–36-month activity for a child that is 18 months.
- Can be adapted to fit the needs or likes of the family and child.
 - Ex: Swapping out listed materials for readily available materials in the home.
 - If a parent wants to work on an activity they saw online, connect it to a PAT Activity.
- Can be chosen when the "What's in It for Us?" section doesn't share the child's developmental goal.
 - Add and discuss the developmental domain to the blank lines.

Development-Centered Parenting & Family Well-Being

- Resources and information can be shared that are agency approved curriculums and/or are researched based, trusted sources for information.
 - Under categories, write in chosen topic.
 - Ex: PAT Curriculum, Family Service Credential (FSC) Training, DECA, Partners for a Healthy Baby Curriculum, Your Journey Together, Conscious Discipline, Dental Curriculum, ECLKC, Play Project, Zero to Three website, Theraplay, HOVRS, Hanen, Mighty Minutes.
- Family Goals can be discussed in this section.
- Community resources can be shared and noted when it pertains to individual needs of the family.

*Not general information that may be shared with all families.

Miscellaneous Updates and Clarification:

- One key point is required per area of the PVPG.
- CFS can use the PAT Parent Handout as the resource when CFS has detailed understanding of the topic being shared.
 - PAT requests that if a CFS needs deeper knowledge, Parent Educator Resource is utilized.
- When child is not present or sleeping, home visit plans can be repeated and/or PVPG form can be reused. The PVPG form *MUST* clearly shows two dates and two signatures from each home visit.
- Providing PAT Parent Handouts is not a requirement at every visit. Providing key points from resources is essential.
- Planning for upcoming visit should be identifiable on form.
 - Ex: PAT activity for next week, shared materials discussed, etc.

Intent: What will we focus on at this visit?

An intent is required to be included in all three areas of the PVPG. (Parent Child Interaction, Development-Centered Parenting, family Well-Being).

Below is a list of examples or starting phrases

- *Encourage* parent-child interaction through play.
- Introduce and discuss areas of child development.
- *Explore* the status of preventative health care.
- **Build parents' awareness** of personal and family views on discipline.
- o **Enhance** parenting strategies for successful transitions.
- o **Discuss** family environments.

Prompts or Questions: to understand the

family's perspective and practice of the topic.

A prompt is required to be included in all three areas of the PVPG. (Parent Child Interaction, Development-Centered Parenting, family Well-Being).

Suggestion- Read the chosen resource to provide ideas on how you would like the conversation to go.

Below is a list of examples or starting phrases

- What have you noticed your child doing that might be unsafe?
- How does your child show you that he is connected to you?
- o Tell me about your mealtime routines.
- What are your thoughts on discipline?
- Tell me about your family's health.
